## A Notable Birthday

In recent years the handsome white Federal-style house at the crest of Pierce Road has been renowned for its gardens. Since they bought the homestead in 1979, Delcie and Marney Bean have cultivated perennial gardens that have attracted local, regional, and national recognition. A stop on numerous garden tours, the Beans' property was featured in *Martha Stewart Living* in 2009.

The Beans' home, originally called the Rufus Piper Homestead and later Dunstable Farm, is celebrating its 200th birthday this year. It was built by Mr. Piper, an accomplished craftsman and builder of the time, who also served as Dublin's Town Moderator and Chairman of the Town's Centennial in 1852.

The main house is connected by a long ell to a beautiful shingled barn, which in the early 1980s was home to several horses belonging to the four Bean daughters. Now the only livestock are Marney's flock of chickens. The house faces south to capture light and sun and to the north it has a view of Mt. Skatutakee over an open rolling hillside.

The south-facing entryway façade with its elliptical fan detail above the front door is also evident in the James (currently the Greene's) house on Old County Road and the Scribner (now the Schnabel's) house on Main Street, both also built by Rufus Piper.

Over its 200 years this homestead has had eight owners and at one point was

surrounded by a golf course. The painting accompanying this article, created by Beekman Pool around 1950, shows the house with a golfer in the foreground. One of the previous owners was Winslow S. Pierce, the inventor of miniature precision ball bearings, after whom the road was named. His wife Mary was the daughter of painter George deForest Brush.

The golf course is gone, the horses are gone, but the Bean homestead remains a

magical place due to its classic architecture and stunning gardens. Marney and Delcie's immediate family now includes their four grown daughters and their husbands along with 10 grandchildren. Everyone in the family returns home numerous times a year and notably on Memorial Day and Christmas. For almost 40 of its 200 years the Beans have been happy stewards of this historic Dublin property.

Remember Wednesday morning "Knit Wits" gather at 10 am. If you knit, would like to, or have a knitting problem come in and chat about it.



# Lake Host Program for 2017

Again this summer, there will be Lake Host coverage at the West Lake Road boat launch on Dublin Lake. The coverage schedule is for eight weeks, starting Friday, July 1, and ending Sunday, August 20. Work days will be Friday, Saturday, and Sunday during this period. The hours will be 9 am to 5 pm each day.

We need to hire a new Lake Host Inspector this year. We will have Annie Garrett-Larsen back with us, but need a second person.

The Lake Host Inspector is an ambassador of NH LAKES and the Dublin Conservation Commission. His or her job responsibility is to greet every boater in the process of launching or removing

a vessel from the water, survey and teach boaters about preventing the spread of aquatic invasive species, and conduct courtesy boat and trailer inspections, if permitted to do so by the boat owner.

He or she should be 18 years of age or older but we may consider qualified 17-year-old candidates. The job pays \$11 per hour.

The new Lake Host Inspector will attend training sessions in Concord, which take place in May and June. Anyone interested in applying may contact Bill Goodwin at [wgoodwin50@aol.com](mailto:wgoodwin50@aol.com).

The Lake Host Program is offered by the New Hampshire Lakes Association. It provides funding via a grant application by the Dublin Conservation Commission. The Beech Hill/Dublin Lake Watershed Association provides funding for ramp coverage.

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
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## News from DCS


Philosophy. He has been accepted to the Xavier University Graduate School in Cincinnati, Ohio, where he will study Theology.

## Dublin Lake 2016 Water Testing Results

*To protect our lake's water quality, reducing storm water runoff is the most important thing we can do.*

Three times every summer Garden Club of Dublin volunteers and a biologist from the NH Department of Environmental Services (DES) head out to the middle of the lake and to the two beaches and boat ramp to take water samples and other measurements. The modest cost for DES running tests on these samples is paid for from the Dublin Conservation Commission budget.

For the first time we have 10 years of data so the DES was able to offer some trend analysis. The good news is that the lake quality is generally similar (good quality) to other lakes of its type.

A major outlier is elevated salt-related measurements likely due to road salt on 101 during the winter.

Phosphorous, which is a nutrient that can increase unwanted plant growth in the lake, is generally within acceptable limits but can vary from year to year depending on rainfall and storm water runoff.

The past two dry years it was lower

A Kemmerer bottle, used to get samples of water from a certain depth in the lake, is propped open and then lowered to a selected depth via a rope. A weight is then sent down the rope, striking the bottle and causing it to close, trapping water from that depth. In the summer it is quite revealing to feel how cold the water is from the depths.



than the previous year when we had huge downpours. Interestingly our testing last summer showed higher transparency (the water was clearer), which the DES biolo-

gist noted was also higher in other lakes and likely due to less rain and therefore less runoff.

We are not aware of any major cyanobacteria bloom last year. Cyanobacteria is a blue-green algae that can contain toxins and result in beach closings.

Also of interest to swimmers, the e-Coli bacteria measurements at the beaches were extremely low, which is good.

The report continues to emphasize that controlling / reducing storm water runoff is the most important thing we can do to protect the lake water quality. Reducing road salt would be helpful as well.



### Jillian Karlicek – Origami


Jillian Karlicek, who is completing her sophomore year at ConVal, is May's artist for the month. She has been producing origami works since the age of 5.

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


## The Art of Albert D. Quigley

The first catalog to celebrate the life and work of Albert D. Quigley (1891-1961) will coincide with the opening of an exhibit of his work at the Historical Society of Cheshire County in Keene from May 9 to September 8. The opening reception is Friday, May 19, at 4 pm.

Throughout the time of this exhibit, related activities will include a talk at the Historical Society on the art and artists of our region during Quig's lifetime; a tour of the cottage on Spofford Lake that still contains murals painted by Quig; and an *en plein air* painting day in Nelson for artists near and far.

Albert Duvall Quigley, an artist, musician, and framemaker, was born in Maine, settled in Keene after service in World War I, and very soon thereafter moved to Nelson where he and his family lived as a vibrant part of the community until his death in 1961.



He was a multi-talented man who became especially well-known for his paintings of the people and places of the Monadnock Region, for playing his fiddle at dances throughout the area, and for making frames for area artists, most notably Alec James. Thus Quig was associated with the Dublin Art Colony at the turn of the last century.

Bauhan Publishing will publish a catalog of Quig's life and work in May. It is sponsored by corporate and private donations; revenue from the sale of the catalogue will be used to enhance a scholarship fund that will enable a Monadnock Region student to pursue the study of art.

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## The Tree Swallow

Finally, after a cold snowy March and early April, the Tree Swallow, a harbinger of spring, has arrived from its winter grounds down south.

It prefers open fields, meadows, beaver ponds, and other wetlands in Dublin. Because it is a hardy species, it can survive early cold in spring by eating juniper and bayberries.

Male Tree Swallows are gun metal blue above and white below, while females are a mix of brown/blue, and juveniles are brown above. The tail is slightly forked. Its voice is a lively warbling twitter.

They arrive in Dublin in late April and begin nesting in early May. They live on the wing and capture flying insects including mayflies and caddisflies when swooping over water, and eat millions of mosquitoes during the summer months. Occasionally, a large pickerel or bass will catch a swallow just as it touches the water surface.

The nest is composed of fine grasses and lined with white feathers. You can toss white feathers into the air and watch the females catch them and take them to a nest box or a nest in a tree hole. Nest boxes should face East or Southeast for maximum use.

A normal clutch is 5-6 eggs and they hatch within 15 days. Young Tree Swallows fledge in about 20 days. They can fly immediately and are fed by the parents on the wing like an Air Force bomber refueling in mid-flight. Only one brood per year is the norm. In some populations 50% of the young are not descendants of the resident male.

By late August, they gather in huge numbers, sometimes hundreds of thousands, sitting on telephone wires at the seacoast or on a sandy beach. This is the only swallow wintering in the U.S.

They have a very high mortality rate with only 20% of young birds reaching an age of one year. Their average life span is 2.7 years. In cold, rainy June months, insects are scarce and this can cause high mortality.

Only the Barn Swallow has a higher ranking for usefulness in the bird family. The Tree Swallow is highly valued in cranberry bogs and mosquito-infested marshes for mosquito control.
