Last date to change your party affiliation.

The Supervisors of the Checklist will be meeting at the Town Hall on Tuesday, June 5, at 7 pm. This is the last day for registered voters to change their party affiliation before the State Primary September 11.

On Primary Election Day, voters will receive the ballot for the party shown as their party affiliation on the checklist. Only undeclared voters may request either a Democrat, Libertarian, or Republican ballot.

You can also register to vote at the June 5th meeting. Please bring: proof of identity (driver's license or photo I.D.), age, domicile (lease, utility bill, property tax bill, or driver's license with street address) and citizenship (birth certificate, naturalization papers, or passport).

If you are not sure whether you are registered to vote or what your party affiliation is, checklists will be posted at the Post Office and the Town Hall or you can check the NH Secretary of State webpage at https://app.sos.nh.gov/Public/PartyInfo.aspx.

Dublin Historical Society Plans WWI Exhibit

Archives will be shown in the Town Hall during August.

This August, the Dublin Historical Society (DHS) will be presenting an exhibit on Dublin's involvement in WWI. The exhibit will be held from August 9 to August 26 on the second floor of the Dublin Town Hall. More information about the exhibit will follow in future articles.

A plaque on the front of the Town Hall lists 25 men from Dublin who served. It

is easy to walk by the plaque and not have knowledge of these men. The DHS exhibit will include information on each soldier, photos taken in France, and ways men and women from Dublin contributed to WWI efforts before, during, and after the war.

Of the 25 men listed on the plaque, 13 went overseas and eight fought at the front. Three were seriously wounded or gassed, though thankfully no one from Dublin died in WWI. Of the three who were injured,



one was Sergeant Charles R. Thomas who was 27 years old when he enlisted in the Army on June 1, 1917. He was part of the 9th Regiment, Company D, 2nd Division who saw action in battles at St. Mihiel, Verdun, and Belleau Woods in France.

On July 4, 1918, Sgt. Thomas was seriously wounded in a mustard gas attack at Chateau Thierry. He recorded his experiences

in a diary that was later donated to DHS. A transcript and the diary will be shown as part of the exhibit. Sgt. Thomas went on to

become a prominent citizen of Dublin until his death at 68 years old.

CELESTE SNITKO is a volunteer at the Dublin Historical Society.

Conscience of the Human Spirit, an exhibit at the Mariposa Museum through Sunday, July 1 (26 Main St., Peterborough) is an exhibit of 51 quilts by African-American quilters who honor the legacy of Nelson Mandela. The quilts touch on themes central to a life of faith: justice, forgiveness, courage, and peace. Admission is \$8, \$6 for seniors or groups of 5 or more. 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The Indigo Bunting

his small migratory bird is known for L the brilliant Indigo blue color of the male. It frequents brushy pastures and weedy locations, especially under power lines. The female is brown. Indigo Buntings are a stocky sparrow-sized bird with short rounded tails. Both birds frequent feeders in Dublin during spring and summer months.

They spend their winter spread out from southern Florida through the Caribbean Islands to Mexico and Central America.

They have been studied closely for migratory patterns and orientation to star patterns in the night sky. Years ago, Cornell scientists studied this bird's migratory patterns to determine how they know where to fly.

As young birds, they observe the North Star. Since Polaris is stationary and the Earth rotates on its axis, the Indigo Bunting orients from Polaris or other constellations within 35 degrees of Polaris, especially Orion.

Here on Earth, the Indigo Bunting has a complex song pattern with the male sing-



ing from the top of a tree. Only the male sings to advertise his territory and chase away other males. Males have more than one mate and females may often be fertilized by more than one male.

Females alone build the nest in a low group of stems; building her nest in a crotch where the branches fork supported by other twigs. She will weave plant materials and bark and leaves wrapped in spider web approximately 3 inches wide and 1½ inches deep in the shape of a cup, in which 3 to 4 eggs are laid. They hatch in 12 to 13 days, slightly longer in cool weather. cool weather.

Females are also the primary food supplier to the young. Perhaps the male is overstressed by all the stars and constellations he used to arrive at the nesting site!

They often return to the breeding site every year, and banding studies have shown they often return to the same wintering site.

Indigo Buntings will appear at feeders that contain small seeds, thistle, and sunflower seed. They will forage on dandelions, twigs,

buds, and tree leaves in the spring. In the summer, their primary diet consists of insects such as caterpillars, aphids, grasshoppers, and cicadas as well as some beetles. They also enjoy a variety of berries such as strawberries, blueberries, and blackberries. Recent sightings have been reported in Dublin.
