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A Tribute to Jeannine Dunne

Recently, I had the pleasure of interviewing my friend, Jeannine Dunne, Dublin's Town Clerk/Tax Collector. She has notified the Select Board of her intent to resign as of December 1 and will be taking a new post in Dover, New Hampshire.

In May of 2006, former Town Clerk/ Tax Collector Barbara Sovik was retiring after twelve and a half years at the desk. The transition of duties from Barbara to Jeannine didn't happen overnight. Jeannine started out part-time. Her days were spent observing as Barbara performed the various tasks required of the position. The State required 30 days of watching how car registrations were done before Jeannine was able to receive the Department of Motor Vehicles password!

Jeannine has attended a myriad of classes, seminars, conferences, and specialized trainings throughout her seventeen years with the Town of Dublin. Each year, she attends a Town Clerk and Tax Collector spring conference. She earned her Certified Town Clerk/Tax Collector status after attending certification classes four years in a row. The DMV required 4-5 days of training in Concord prior to being approved for automobile registrations. Even something as straightforward as

Vital Records requires two days of training to learn what information needs to be gathered and verified for birth and death certificates, and marriage licenses and certifications. Election laws seem to change several times a year, and they also need to be studied and understood.

COVID challenged everyone in Town Hall, and the need to protect citizens was foremost in the minds of town employees. Online payments were offered, and entrance to the Town Hall took on new protocols: use of the "drop box" for docu-



ments and payments, only one person in the Town Clerk/Tax Collector's office at a time, and a requirement to "mask up." If a face-to-face meeting was necessary, appointments were required.

Jeannine's last day in the office is November 30. She is moving to Newmarket, NH, and has already found an apartment and a position with the City of Dover.

She will be their Deputy Tax Collector and will provide automobile titles and registrations for the DMV. With a population of 32,000, it's quite a change from Dublin's 1,600 souls! To say she'll be busy is an understatement.

Jeannine is the mother of two sons. Her younger, Nicholas, is attending Providence College in Rhode Island. Stefan, the older, is married and living in Waltham, Massachusetts. She is looking forward to this new adventure and living so near Portsmouth and all it has to offer. She has enjoyed working with her skillful deputy, Neil Sandford, Town Administrator Kate Fuller, and her assistant, Pam Cox, in such a pleasant atmosphere.

She will miss so many of the wonderful people she's known over the years. She asks that we all welcome the next person to "sit behind the cage," and be patient.

Godspeed in your new adventure, Jeannine! We wish you the very best.

They have decided to pay down the tax rate using unassigned fund balance to assist residents with their tax bills. The 2022 tax rate will be \$24.97 per

Cross-country mountain
bike racing is intense in
New Hampshire, and the Dublin School Nordic Center is fast
becoming a hub for both local
riders and high school racers.
With almost six miles of mostly
machine-built single-track, the
Dublin School trails system
is technical at times, flowy at
times, and always on a hill,
making them some of the most
challenging and fun trails in the
Monadnock region.

This year's Dublin School
Mountain Bike Team included
17 riders with a wide range of
experience from all over the
United States. The team recently
wrapped up their competitive season,
with the highlight being their home race
on October 26, which ended with Dublin
winning a top-ten finish and two podium
finishes. Out of 120 racers, senior Kemp
Wagenbach '23 placed tenth in the Boys
A race, Will Putnam '25 placed first in
the Boys B race, and Elias Sieswerda '26
placed first in the Boys C race.

Coach Jesse Jackson said, "I was happy to

get two first-place podiums in the race. Elias and Will had great races! The exciting part is that these two riders are only in the 9th and 10th grades, so the future of Dublin Mountain Biking is looking very promising!"

Like all great endurance races, the community of fans, parents, and volunteers makes the day great. "It was fantastic to see all the racers enjoying the fun and challenging terrain at the Nordic Center,"

said Lisa Bates, Dublin Nordic Center Director.

The Nordic Center is building a new MTB skills park, thanks to a \(\) grant from the Dublin Community Foundation and in partnership with Dublin XC, a local ski club based out of the center that is expanding its programming to include mountain biking. One of the first new programs to use the park will be an all-girls summer mountain biking program starting in 2023.

The Nordic Center is open to the public for biking, running, and skiing.

News from the ConVal School Board

Here are three items of interest among the many your ConVal School Board is addressing:

- 1. Community Forum. On November 10, we held our fourth in-person and on-line community forum. In-house attendance was the highest of the four. On-line attendance is exceeding expectations. The three presentations were on the renovation project for the high school, Applied Technology Center, and middle schools; the new strategic plan; and upcoming events, with Q/A sessions following. If you were not able to attend in person or on-line and would like to learn more, the forum is available on youtube. com/c/ConValEvents. Click on the video 2022 November 10 Community Forum.
- 2. The Budget. Yes, it is the season again when we develop the budget for the next school year. The budget process, before finalization for presentation and voting by the ConVal community, is a multi-step process between the school board and administration. The board gives guidance to the administration as to what direction should be taken in the development of the budget. This year, the board directed the administration to present a level-service budget with allowances for inflation, i.e., fuel oil and electricity. We

then meet and discuss what was presented; we question, and often ask for more information and justifications for certain programs/items. The administration returns that information to us. The process repeats until we are satisfied; then we vote on our acceptance of the budget.

It is a long, involved process but a necessary one. The presentation to the public is done at the deliberative session as a Q/A session. Then the vote is taken in March.

There are many important considerations to be aware of. There are two bills for the school district each year. The June bill is for the coming school year but is based on the prior year's budget amount. So it is not a true reflection of the new budget impact. This is due to legislative and accounting needs. The December 2023 bill is then a reflection of the new budget and will reflect the increase or decrease of the new budget. It is important to note that even with a nearly flat budget, the change to district assessment (your taxes) can increase. This is due to revenue sources changing from the federal and or state levels. Revenues may change, expenses may stay the same, and the difference needs to come from somewhere - your taxes. We will keep you posted on developments.

3. Consolidation/reconfiguration. This is the elephant in the room and a subject

of discussion for many years. We do not have an answer now, but we will be going through a full evaluation process to determine if, how, and when we will consolidate/reconfigure the schools in the district.

We are looking to engage an external organization to work with us to gather information, lay out activity plans, engage with the community, and develop recommendations. The first step in this process is the development of a request for information/interest (RFI) to be sent to selected organizations. We will develop communications about our process and will share with our community in coming weeks.

Reality Check Offers Film Series on Mental Health and Addiction

Reality Check, a nonprofit in Jaffrey providing drug and alcohol addiction services to the Eastern Monadnock Region, is offering a film series on major social issues impacting communities, families, kids, and businesses.

Mental health challenges exploded for people of all ages with the onset of COVID-19, but particularly for children, teenagers, and people who struggle with addiction. Untreated mental health issues can and often do lead to drug and alcohol use, abuse, addiction, and overdose, and when this happens, can become the primary drivers for suicide, self-injury, substance use, and depression.

This film series at the Park Theater in Jaffrey is free to the public, aims to raise awareness around the social issues our young people are dealing with today, and educate the public about the true scope and depth of the resulting fallout.

The series speaks to the issue of bullying and why what we're doing to prevent it hasn't necessarily worked; suicide, and why young people can think this their only solution; sobriety in a world of immediate access to drugs and alcohol; mental health

and addiction stigma; the need to come together as a community to show compassion for people who have these struggles; the urgency to begin providing adequate, accessible, affordable services.

December 12, Depression: Out of the Shadows is a multi-dimensional PBS project that explores the disease's complex terrain.

January 9 and 23, *The Pharmacist* (two parts). A small-town pharmacist in Poydras, Louisiana, works to identify his son's killer and how this led to his gathering evidence against a prolific "pill mill" doctor in New Orleans.

February 13, 10, and 27, My Emotional Life (three parts). This movie explores ways to improve our social relationships, cope with emotional issues, and become more positive, resilient individuals. Each episode weaves together the compelling personal stories of ordinary people and the latest in brain science research, along with revealing comments from celebrities such as Chevy Chase, Larry David, Elizabeth Gilbert, Alanis Morissette, Katie Couric, and Richard Gere.


Lights of Love at MCH to Benefit MATS

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Recycling Is Mandatory at the Transfer Station!

The Select Board has been working with Transfer Station Superintendent Tom Kennedy to ensure that the town can

provide for the disposal of municipal solid waste in an environmentally safe and economical manner for residents. This process has included reviewing and updating the

Violation Penalties:

Transfer Station's ordinance, fee schedule, and list of acceptable materials for mandatory recycling, which was posted in the November *Advocate* and can be found on the town's website www.townofdublin.org.

Dublin contracts with the city of Keene for disposal of hazardous waste and propane gas tanks at Keene's Transfer Station on assigned dates. A new 2023 schedule will be posted at the Dublin's Transfer Station and on the town's website.

Please remember that recycling in Dublin is mandatory, and it saves tax dollars! Fees are applied to some items. The current fee schedule is shown in the table at left. It is important to know that penalties will be applied for violating the Transfer Station Ordinance.

Volkert Volkersz Retires as DubHub Program Coordinator

The sign in front of the Dublin Community Center said, "Open Mic Tonight." On vacation in New Hampshire, Volkert Volkersz and his wife, Sandi, saw the sign and showed up. For two hours, he and Bruce Simpson (shown below) swapped tunes with the two people in the audience – Sandi and Nancy Cayford. That was 2014, the beginning of Volkert's connection to the DubHub.

In 2016 Volkert retired from his job in education in Washington state, moved to Peterborough, and began establishing links to the area's folk music scene. Bruce invited him to perform at the DubHub's annual chicken barbecue. Soon after, he began attending DubHub events. When the DubHub was looking for a new program coordinator in 2017, Volkert recognized he had the interest in the arts and the skills as a former librarian, music teacher, and concert promoter.

Fast forward to 2022. Under Volkert's leadership, the DubHub is recognized as a

place where people of all ages and backgrounds are welcome. Volkert's creativity and commitment to the community strengthened traditions and created new programs. The DubHub has a vibrant music scene – open mic, Song Circle, and ukulele groups. Volkert is especially proud of several benefit concerts he has organized, including some in collaboration with the Dublin Community Church and the Friends of the Dublin Library. Volkert has nurtured and developed other events including Stories and Poems, the photo contest, author readings, and Code Club.

Volkert persevered by keeping the community connected during the height of the COVID epidemic. He initiated many events via Zoom, such as a Neighbor-to-Neighbor program pairing long-term Dublin residents with newcomers, and discussions on topics such as the musical *Hamilton* and the Beatles' *Get Back* documentary. He also helped launch a new website.

As Volkert reflects on his tenure at the DubHub, he shares how he has grown professionally and personally. He is grateful for the support from the community and the DubHub Board. In terms of music, Volkert says, "I could not have done it without Bruce Simpson" – his musical talent, inspiration, and friendship. He reflects fondly on Bruce's son, Paul – "watching him grow as a musician has been a thrill." In terms of Stories and Poems, Volkert says "it developed another side of me that I didn't know was there." He credits Paul Tuller and Robert Eichler with coaching him.

Other projects at the DubHub brought Volkert a "great deal of joy," such as developing the weekly newsletter, *Hubbub from the DubHub*, and creating event posters. Also, since coming to Dublin, Volkert has enjoyed learning about New England traditions and government. He credits the "late, great Tim Clark" with educating him on how our town government works.

Volkert remarks that "the DubHub has been a big part of my life." After leaving his position, he plans to "keep the creative side going." He will continue writing and performing folk and religious music, and writing stories. He also plans to spend more time walking and hiking with Sandi.

Thank you, Volkert, for being such an integral part of the DubHub family and our community. We look forward to hearing your music and stories for many years to come.

Land Conservation Investment Program at Mud Pond

Between 1986 and 1993, the Land Conservation Investment Program (LCIP) and the Trust for New Hampshire Lands protected more than 100,000 acres of land across the state using funds appropriated by the legislature and governor. Dublin is one of 78 municipalities that protects environmentally important land purchased through LCIP as either fee-owned (owned by the town) or conservation easements. Mud Pond is an example of land that has been conserved through fee-ownership in Dublin.

In 2002 LCIP became the Conservation Land Stewardship (CLS) program as it transitioned away from acquisition of new properties to stewardship of existing conservation lands. The fee-owned properties are fully owned by the municipality, and they are to be managed in a way that protects the value of the property. A signed, legally binding project agreement for each property clearly spells out the responsibilities of the municipality to monitor and protect its conservation value forever. Annual monitoring is carried out by volunteers of



the Conservation Commission who then report to the CLS.

As a large wetland, the importance of conserving almost 200 acres around Mud Pond cannot be overstated, as it sits above the main stratified drift aquifer in town. This past September, Jay Schechter and John Morris of the Conservation Commission accompanied Charlotte Harding of

the CLS on a field visit to Mud Pond. They checked boundaries and found little to report other than the importance of clearly marked boundaries to limit encroachment by abutters. Of course, they enjoyed the beautiful scenery, peace, and quiet all around.

New Hampshire Drought Continues

Our NH Department of Environmental Services (NHDES) reports that we are in the midst of our third statewide drought in the past 20 years. As of mid-October, the hardest hit parts of our state were along the seacoast and in the Lower Connecticut River Valley. Statewide, 34% of the state was experiencing some measure of drought as of mid-October, with some 265,400 state residents impacted. (NHDES monitors water supplies for six municipalities and 100 community water systems for its data.)

Here in Dublin, we can see how low our rivers and streams are for this time of year. Advocate readers know we need considerable rainfall during November-December to rebuild our groundwater levels, and our soils continue to be very dry for this time of year. NHDES is recommending that the 100 community water systems and six municipalities' water resources that they

monitor continue to observe NHDES water restrictions, and that all of us watch how much water we all use indoors. Running out of water has expensive remedies, and with holidays coming we should avoid incurring expensive remedies to Mother Nature's shortfalls.

Community Power Meeting on November 30

On Wednesday, November 30, at 7 pm, Cheshire County Commissioner Terry Clark is scheduled to attend the Dublin Energy Committee's monthly meeting. He will be available to answer questions about the proposed Cheshire County Electric Aggregation Plan, also known as Cheshire Community Power. If the plan is approved by the county's governing authority, there will be various ways for residents, businesses, and municipalities to participate in the plan.

Cheshire Community Power will launch as an "opt-in" program to supply electricity to county facilities. Any customer within Cheshire County (residential, business, municipal) may voluntarily opt-in to receiving their electricity supply from Cheshire Community Power and benefit from pooled purchasing power. Utilities will continue to deliver electricity to customers and to own and operate the local distribution system (poles, wires, transformers, substations, etc.). They will also continue to provide customer service and billing. Participation in Cheshire Community Power is completely voluntary.

Cheshire Community Power may offer "default electricity supply" to municipalities that request to participate by vote of their governing body (e.g., Select Board). For towns that choose to join, Cheshire Community Power will become the default electricity provider for residents, businesses, and other electric accounts that currently receive "utility default electricity supply." The program is voluntary, and any customer may choose to "opt-out" back to the utility or a competitive energy supplier

at any time with no penalty. Customers on competitive supply may choose to opt-in or stay with their current supplier.

Opting into Cheshire Community Power could help to lower our electricity supply costs and offer other benefits including renewable power sourcing. To learn

Dublin's Budget: Who Does This?

All towns need an operating budget; there are bills to pay, services to render, and employees to compensate.

Dublin is a New Hampshire Municipal Budget Law town (governed by RSA Chapter 32). This means that the Select Board prepares a budget in consultation with department heads and committee chairs, which is then submitted to the Budget Committee. Both boards evaluate current costs, anticipated expenditures, and revenues. The Budget Committee reviews the Select Board's request, prepares the final budget, and holds a public hearing in early February as required by NH State law. This is the budget that gets submitted to the town for you to vote on at Town Meeting in March.

Both boards work very hard to meet the needs of the residents and practice fiscal responsibility. The Budget Committee meets once at the end of the first and second quarters to review quarterly expenses and revenues. From late September to early February, the Budget Committee meets every Tuesday evening at 7 pm in the Town Hall. Two of the six members of the committee are elected by town vote each year for a staggered, three-year term.

Transparency in government is one of the hallmarks of democracy. Residents are welcome to come to meetings either in person or by Zoom to learn about the budget process. It is important for all of us to become more aware of how our tax dollars are being spent.

Please consider running for membership on the Budget Committee. Dublin is evergrowing and changing, and therefore it is important to keep ideas and viewpoints fresh and reflective of the community.

Out in Left Field . . . with Judy Mortner

Enthusiastic recommendations from the Monadnock region

Here's a tip for a great night out — affordable, casual (no need to change out of jeans), and deeply delicious. I'm talking about pizza and beer — specifically, wood-fired pizza, right off Blackfire Farm's pizza truck, parked every weekend outside of Post & Beam Brewing in Peterborough. And while you wait for your pizza, head upstairs to Post & Beam, order from a list of craft beers and start sipping while your pizza works in the truck's wood-fired oven outside.

Upon arriving, you'll wait in line with your fellow thin-crust pizza lovers, stamping your feet to keep warm while you read the blackboard menu. Regular offerings like "Sweet Lips" (Italian sausage from Archway farm in Keene, sweet onion, local honey) and "Buffalo Chicken" (pastureraised chicken, buffalo sauce, walla walla onion, and bleu cheese) show up weekly along with weekend specials. Recently, both "Harvest Moon" and "Fall Forage" appeared on the menu, loaded with farm grown vegetables like pumpkin, kale, apples, and roasted shallots. This is delicious thin-crust pizza, with charred edges, farm fresh vegetable toppings, and drizzled house-made aioli.

Blackfire Farm is located in Hancock and run by Douglas Higley and Elizabeth White. All the produce is grown in organic soil, using sustainable growing practices, and the chicken is pasture-raised and fed organic feed. Recently the pair took a weekend off to marry, but the truck is open once again. You will find Liz smiling through the window, taking orders, making



change, and boxing up pies straight from the oven – she keeps it running smoothly, and her quick wit is an added bonus. Afterward, you'll put your empty pizza box in the wire bin outside to be composted back at the farm.

Pizza in hand, head upstairs to Post

& Beam's cozy taproom with communal tables, long wooden bar, and knowledgeable bartenders. Choose from an assortment of high-quality craft beers on tap that rotate often. I've especially liked the crisp Italian pilsner Shining World and a friend liked her New England IPA so much, she bought a four-pack in cans to take home. Both branded glasses and four-packs of a selection of the on-tap beers are for sale, and that would make a nice pairing as a holiday gift.

Go on your own and make a friend or chat with one of the friendly bartenders, or bring a friend and introduce them to a great local night out. The beer will be refreshing, the atmosphere warm and cozy, and you'll remember why you love living here
